No U-Turns and No Backing-Up



Drivers should not make "U-Turns" or "back-up" their vehicle in a school zone. It is difficult for drivers who are making a "U-Turn" or "backing-up" to see small children crossing the street. "U-Turns" can be confusing for children as they may not be able to anticipate such irregular vehicular movements. ***This includes in the front of the school.***

Obey School Speed Zone



The legal speed limit in front of our school is 20mph. ALL vehicles are required by law to follow these limits. Please control your speed in front of the school for everyone's safety. Please be courteous to those that choose to walk and be aware of pedestrians, not only at the crosswalk, but also at street corners near our school. Please drive slowly and stop for pedestrians.

Pick-Up and Drop-Off Only



Pick-Up and Drop-Off Only NO PARKING

Please do not stop in a "No Parking" zone for any reason. "No Parking" zones are designated in areas where a stopped vehicle could obstruct the visibility of other drivers and pedestrians. Please do not park in these areas.

Handicap Parking

Please do not park in spots that are reserved for people with a disability. We have students that require handicap parking, so please leave those spots open for the people who need them.



School Bus Safety



When a stopped school bus flashes its red light (s), traffic that approaches from either direction, even in front of the school and in school parking lots, must stop before it reaches the bus. You should stop at least 20 feet (6 m) away from the bus. You can identify this bus by a "SCHOOL BUS" sign, the red lights on the top, and its unique yellow orange color. Before a school bus stops to load or discharge passengers, the driver will usually flash yellow warning lights. When you see them, decrease speed and be prepared to stop. When you stop for a school bus, you can not drive again until the red lights stop flashing or when the bus driver or a traffic officer signals that you can proceed. **This law applies on all roadways in New York State. You must stop for a school bus even if it is on the opposite side of a divided highway.**

After you stop for a school bus, look for children along the side of the road. Drive slowly until you have passed them. Remember that vehicles that transport people with disabilities can be equipped as school buses and you must stop for them as you would for other school buses.

School Closings

As we approach the winter months it is very important that we continue communicating with our community members in a fast and efficient manner. Whenever road conditions in the Lyncourt Union Free School District require closing school, for all or part of the regularly scheduled school day, major commercial radio stations will be notified as soon as possible, as well as T.V. channels 3 (NBC)/5 (CBS) CNY Central, 9 (ABC), and 10 (Time Warner YNN News Channel 10) and our School Messenger automated system. Please listen carefully to the phone messages and read text messages from the school, as they contain very valuable information. There may be an occasion where we delay at the start of a school day or a very rare occasion of a weather related early dismissal. Please be certain that you have reviewed with your child(ren) the plans made with them for either of these circumstances.

During inclement weather, district officials closely monitor weather forecasts using a variety of weather services. The decision to close or delay school varies, with many factors being considered, including weather conditions and the ability to operate the building with full utilities. The decision to close or delay can usually be made by 6:15 a.m. It is possible that a delay will become a **closing if the conditions fail to improve or worsen. The safety of our students is top priority in making these decisions.**

Appointments

Please call ahead for an appointment, as not all personnel are available on a "drop-in" basis. Everyone will be served better if appointments can be made in advance.

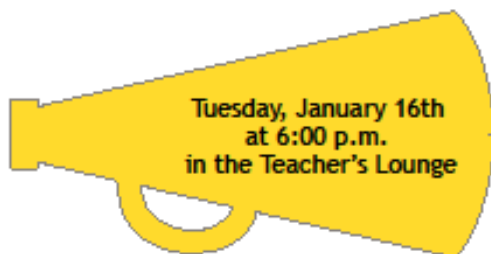

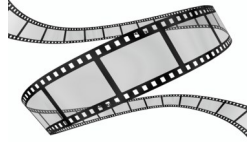

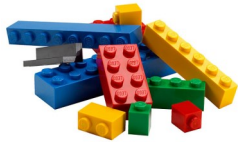

Children with these conditions and children who are receiving long-term aspirin therapy can have severe illness from the flu.

How does the flu spread?

Most experts believe that flu viruses spread mainly by droplets made when people with the flu cough, sneeze or talk. These droplets can land in the mouths or noses of people who are nearby. Less often, a person might get the flu by touching something that has flu virus on it and then touching their own mouth, eyes or nose.

What are the symptoms of the flu?

Symptoms of the flu can include fever, cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, body aches, headache, chills, fatigue and sometimes vomiting and diarrhea (more common in children than adults). Some people with the flu will not have a fever.

How long can a sick person spread the flu to others?

People with the flu may be able to infect others by shedding virus from 1 day before getting sick to 5 to 7 days after. However, children and people with weakened immune systems can shed virus for longer, and may be still contagious past 5 to 7 days of flu illness, especially if they still have symptoms.

PROTECT YOUR CHILD

How can I protect my child against the flu?

To protect against the flu, the first and most important thing you can do is to get a flu vaccine for yourself and your child.

Vaccination is recommended for everyone 6 months and older.

It's especially important that young children and children with long term health conditions get vaccinated. (See list of conditions in "How serious is the flu?")

Caregivers of children with health conditions or of children younger than 6 months old should get vaccinated. (Babies younger than 6 months are too young to be vaccinated themselves.)

Another way to protect babies is to vaccinate pregnant women. Research shows that flu vaccination gives some protection to the baby both while the woman is pregnant and for up to 6 months after the baby is born.

FLU INFORMATION

What is the flu?

Influenza (the flu) is an infection of the nose, throat, and lungs caused by influenza viruses.

There are many different influenza viruses that are constantly changing. Flu viruses cause illness, hospital stays and deaths in the United States each year. The flu can be very dangerous for children. Each year about 20,000 children younger than 5 years old are hospitalized from flu complications, like pneumonia.

How serious is the flu?

Flu illness can vary from mild to severe. While the flu can be serious even in people who are otherwise healthy, it can be especially dangerous for young children and children of any age who have certain long-term health conditions, including asthma (even mild or controlled), neurological and neurodevelopmental conditions, chronic lung disease, heart disease, blood disorders, endocrine disorders (such as diabetes), kidney, liver, and metabolic disorders, and weakened immune systems due to disease or medication.

From our school nurse:

When to keep your child home – Lyncourt School Policy states:

In order to prevent the spread of communicable disease including influenza in school, to protect the health of all children and staff at school and optimize your own child's health, it is advisable that you keep your child home for the following reasons:

A temperature of 100°F or more is considered a fever. Your child should be fever free for 24 hours and not require medication to remain fever free before returning to school.

A diagnosis of strep throat. Your child should remain home until he/she has been on antibiotics for a full 24 hours before returning to school.

Keep your child home if he/she:

Has vomited during the previous night or that morning.

Has several episodes of diarrhea

Has moist, productive cough, chest congestion or thick nasal discharge.

Has eye(s) that are swollen, red or draining.

Has a rash you cannot identify.

REMEMBER: Washing your hands is the best way to stop the spread of germs and stay healthy.

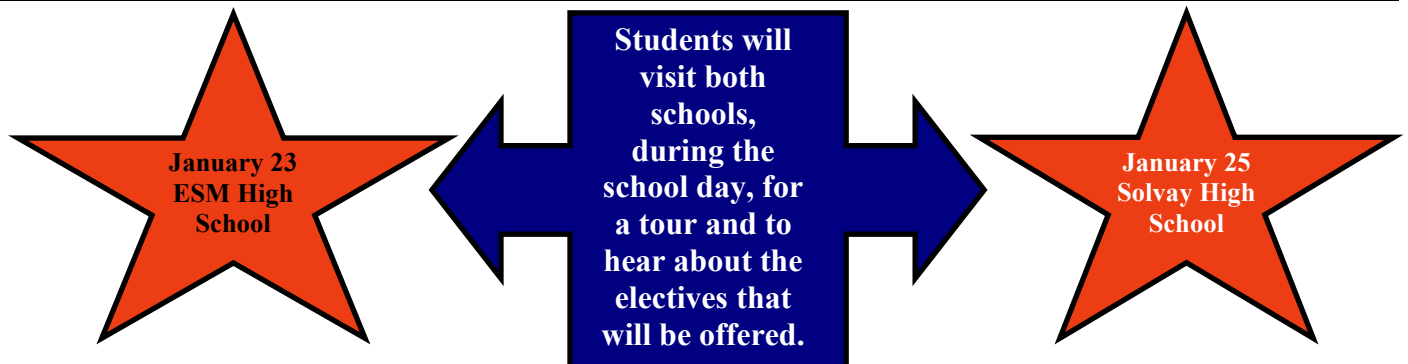

Common Questions and Answers

Q: Do families pay tuition to attend high schools?

A: No. Lyncourt UFSD pays tuition to either Solvay UFSD or East Syracuse Minoa Central School District. Parents who choose to send their child to a private school will continue to pay that school's tuition.

Q: If my child already attends Solvay High School, are both schools an option for their younger siblings?

A: Yes, 8th-grade students can attend either High School. Current Solvay students will complete their remaining secondary years at Solvay.

Q: Will students be able to participate in extra-curricular activities?

A: Yes, students can participate in any extra-curricular activity they choose, at their selected high school.

Q: Who do I contact if I have questions about which high school would be the best fit for my child?
