Parents as Reading Partners (P.A.R.P.)

We all want our children to develop good reading habits. Reading is the most important skill learned in school, but like all skills, reading requires practice. School cannot provide enough practice alone. Your help is needed, as well. Parents as Reading Partners (P.A.R.P.) provides the perfect opportunity for you to read with your child. Fifteen minutes a day makes a big difference in your child's attitude toward reading. It exposes your child to new vocabulary, helps in comprehension, and introduces your child to new ideas, new places, and new things. It is one of the most important things you can do for your child.

As we continue to encourage reading at home, here are some other ways you can support your child's learning and school:

No U-Turns and No Backing-Up



Drivers should not make "U-Turns" or "back-up" their vehicle in a school zone. It is difficult for drivers who are making a "U-Turn" or "backing-up" to see small children crossing the street. "U-Turns" can be confusing for children as they may not be able to anticipate such irregular vehicular movements. *This* includes in the front of the school.

Obey School Speed Zone



The legal speed limit in front of our school is 20 mph. ALL vehicles are required by law to follow these limits. Please control your speed in front of the school for everyone's safety. Please be courteous to those that choose to walk and be aware of pedestrians, not only at the crosswalk, but also at street corners near our school. Please drive slowly and stop for pedestrians.

Pick-Up and **Drop-Off Only** NO PARKING

Please do not park in a "No Parking" zone for any reason. "No Parking" zones are designated in areas where a stopped vehicle could obstruct the visibility of other drivers and not park in these are-

Remember, this is a "Safe School Zone"; please follow all posted notices.

Handicap Parking

Please do not park in spots that are reserved for people with a disability. We have students that require handicap parking, so please leave those spots open for the people



School Bus Safety

When a stopped school bus flashes its red light(s), traffic that approaches from either direction, even in front of the school and in school parking lots, must stop before it reaches the bus. You should stop at least 20 feet (6 m) away from the bus. You can identify this bus by a "SCHOOL BUS" sign, the red lights on the top, and its unique yellow orange

Before a school bus stops to load or discharge passengers, the driver will usually flash yellow warning lights. pedestrians. Please do When you see them, decrease speed and be prepared to stop. When you stop for a school bus, you can not drive again until the red lights stop flashing or when the bus driver or a traffic officer signals that you can proceed. This law applies on all roadways in New York State. You must stop for a school bus even if it is on the opposite side of a divided highway.

> After you stop for a school bus, look for children along the side of the road. Drive slowly until you have passed them.

Remember that vehicles that transport people with disabilities can be equipped as school buses and you must stop for them as you would for other school buses.

Flu season is upon us! Keeping hands clean is one of the most important steps we can take to avoid getting sick and spreading germs to others. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention shares when you should wash your hands:

Before, during, and after preparing food; Before eating food; Before and after caring for someone who is sick; Before and after treating a cut or wound; After using the toilet; After changing diapers or cleaning up a child who has used the toilet; After blowing your nose, coughing, or sneezing; After touching an animal or animal waste; and After touching garbage. Wash, wash, wash your hands.

School Closings

As we approach the winter months it is very important that we continue communicating with our community members in a fast and efficient manner. Whenever weather conditions in the Lyncourt Union Free School District require closing school, for all or part of the regularly scheduled school day, major commercial radio stations will be notified as soon as possible, as well as T.V. channels 3 (NBC)/5 (CBS) CNY Central, 9 (ABC), and 10 (Spectrum News Channel 10) and our School Messenger automated system. Please listen carefully to the phone messages and read text messages from the school, as they contain very valuable information. There may be an occasion where we delay the start of a school day or a very rare occasion of a weather related early dismissal. Please be certain that you have reviewed with your child(ren) the plans made with them for either of these circumstances.

During inclement weather, district officials closely monitor weather forecasts using a variety of weather services. The decision to close or delay school varies, with many factors being considered, including weather conditions and the ability to operate the building with full utilities. The decision to close or delay can usually be made by 6:15 a.m. It is possible that a delay will become a closing if the conditions fail to improve or worsen. The safety of our students is top priority in making these decisions.

School Messenger Notifications

To participate and receive School Messenger Notifications on your cell, just text **YES or OPTIN** to the short code 67587. Msg. and data rates may apply. We use this as a platform for parent and guardian notifications, just one extra way for you to stay informed. You can also follow us on Facebook and Twitter. For snow delays and closings, we will use local news stations, radio, facebook and twitter, and the School Messenger Notification System.

Sleep in School-Aged Children

School-aged children need around 10 hours of sleep per night. Not getting enough sleep is common in this age group, given homework, evening activities, and later bedtimes. Sleep problems are also common, including sleepwalking, sleep terrors, teeth grinding, nighttime fears, snoring, and noisy breathing.



Signs of sleep deprivation in children can include:

Mood & Behavior. Sleep deprivation may cause your child to be irritable. In addition, they may have a difficult time regulating their moods and are more likely to have behavior problems, such as noncompliance and hyperactivity.

Cognitive ability. Inadequate sleep may result in problems with attention, memory, decision making, reaction time, and creativity.

How to help your school-aged child sleep well

Develop a regular sleep schedule and consistent bedtime routine. Your child should go to bed and wake up around the same time each day. Their bedtime routine should be consistent every night and include calm activities. Including one-on-one time with a parent is helpful in having a positive connection every day.

Set up a soothing sleep environment. Make sure your child's bedroom is comfortable, dark, cool and quiet. A night-light is fine; a television is not.

Contact your child's doctor. Speak to your child's physician if your child has difficulties falling asleep or staying asleep, snores, experiences unusual awakenings or has sleep problems that are causing disruption during the day.



Common Questions and Answers

Q: Do families pay tuition to attend high schools?

A: No. Lyncourt UFSD pays tuition to either Solvay UFSD or East Syracuse Minoa Central School District. Parents who choose to send their child to a private school will continue to pay that school's tuition.

Q: If my child already attends Solvay High School, are both schools an option for their younger siblings?

A: Yes, 8th grade students can attend either High School. Current Solvay students will complete their remaining secondary years at Solvay.

Q: Will students be able to participate in extra-curricular activities?

A: Yes, students can participate in any extra-curricular activity they choose, at their selected high school.

O: Who do I contact if I have questions about which high school would be the best fit for my child?

A. School Counselor Mrs. Amy MacCaull. amaccaull@lyncourtschool.org (315) 455-7571

Q: Will students going to high school be provided with transportation?

A: Yes, students will be bussed to either Solvay UFSD or ESM School District. The prospective district will contact you with transportation information.

Q: Can my child change schools if we discover the school does not fit my child?

A: After parents have committed their student to a specific school, the Superintendent will consider a transfer request prior to April 1 for the following academic year. After April 1st, only under extreme circumstances, will a transfer be permitted as it will impact the transcript of the transfer student and the tuition commitment made by the Lyncourt UFSD to the high school of choice. A student who would like the Lyncourt UFSD Superintendent to consider a transfer must submit a letter to the Superintendent articulating the rationale behind said request and his/her most recent report card prior to April 1st. After received, the Superintendent will schedule a meeting with the student and his/her parent.
