Task: You will be giving a book talk at the beginning of week two when we return from summer break. Your one job over the summer will be to read (1) grade-appropriate, never read before book. You will be responsible for answering the below questions in the form of a brief, 2 minute, book talk. If you have any questions, email me at acretaro@lyncourtschool.org. Focus on Protagonist & Theme

- Bring book for Title & Author...
- Protagonist. Who is the main character? Describe them in great detail to me. Physical, personality, relationships, actions etc. Provide (2) specific examples of text evidence about the setting so your listeners can visualize what you're talking about.
- Discuss an important <u>theme</u> that is present in the story. (Love, friendship, acceptance etc.) Why do you feel that this is a possible theme? How is this important to the story? <u>Support this theme with (2) specific examples of text evidence</u> from the story.
