

How Long have I been teaching?

I have been teaching for 30 years, but only 20 ½ at Lyncourt. What inspired me to become a teacher?

Having been a published, research scientist was a profoundly rewarding and inspiring career; however, I found that I wanted to do more. I wanted to share my passion for science and inspire young people to pursue a career in the science field, and what better way to do so was to become a teacher. This is my "Why".

What has been the most rewarding part of teaching for me? The most rewarding part of teaching for me is when students come back to visit and tell me that I was their favorite teacher; or that I taught them much more than science; or that I was the reason they chose a career in science. Do I have a favorite memory or moment from my time at Lyncourt?

I have many favorite memories from the relationships I have formed with my students and those made with my close colleagues. The laughter with Dan, Jim, Brian, Rachel and Sue every morning to the lunches spent with Heather debriefing and talking about our next crochet projects. But most of all, I will NEVER forget the honor of the open discussions and sharing of experiences I had with students before and after school about life, friends and school. I will miss this the most.

How do I hope my former students remember me?

I hope that that they remember me as a passionate, inspiring teacher; a person who genuinely cared about them as individuals; who was helpful both academically as well as in their life choices; and that I was a positive influence in their life.

How did I stay motivated and passionate about teaching all these years?

I just kept focusing on my "WHY". In addition, I had many inspiring moments through the Master Teacher program and BOCES-they gave me opportunities to interact with other passionate teachers to share ideas that worked in the classroom. Most of all, it was the interactions with my students that always kept me passionate and motivated. I wanted to always be the best for them.

Are there any traditions or routines in my classroom that I am especially proud of?

Greeting students at the door before each class and checking in with each one daily. Starting off each class with a Science Fact of the Day and sharing all of my "Mrs. Eriksonisms" with the students.

What are my plans for retirement?

I plan to continue working with young people; spend more time with my three grandchildren and friends; travel; garden; read and open my Etsy store.

How long have you been teaching? 32 years

What inspired you to become a teacher in the first place?

My aunt, Jill Modafferi, inspired me to become a teacher after I completed a 5 week field placement in her Special Education classroom. What has been the most rewarding part of teaching for you?

I think the most rewarding part of my teaching career has been watching the transformation my students make from September to June. Seeing their progress and smiles when they finally "GET IT" always makes me happy and proud.

Do you have a favorite memory or moment from your time at Lyncourt?

There have been so many memorable moments at Lyncourt School that it is too hard to pinpoint just one. However, the friendships that I have developed over the past 32 years are probably the most meaningful for me.

How do you hope your former students remember you years from now?

I hope my students know that I always had their best interests at heart, not just academically, but beyond the classroom as well. I always tried to make learning fun for them. So, I hope they remember me as the teacher who inspired and motivated them to persevere, even when things got tough.

How did you stay motivated and passionate about teaching all these years? Over the years, what truly kept me motivated was the quiet moments- the breakthroughs, thank- yous, and the resilience I saw in my students. Remembering why I started teaching and how I could be a steady, positive presence in someone's life made my calling worth it.

Are there any traditions or routines in your classroom that you're especially proud of? I always thought that conducting morning meeting each day was a chance to connect with my students. I think this routine was the most powerful for me.

What are your plans for retirement? I plan on working part-time, spending time with my family, especially my granddaughter, and travelling to places I've never been.
